



Survey Results of Secondary Schools conducted across Kosovo

of students were 17 and 18-year-olds







There was a relatively balanced representation of male and female participants.






The cities the students come from:









I don't feel comfortable meeting people that don't speak my language.




What are the official languages in Kosovo?








